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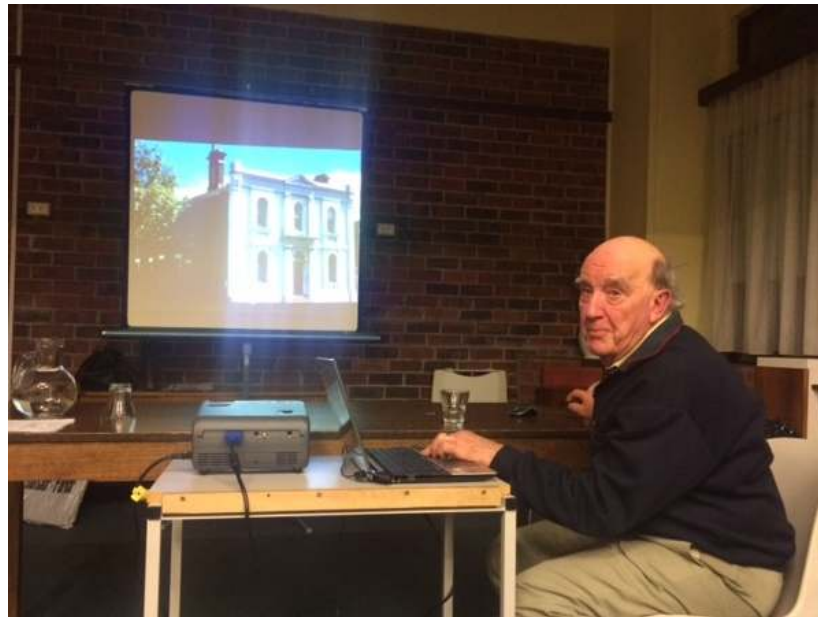

British Interest Group

We are a small group of enthusiastic members of the Tasmanian Family History Society Inc., Launceston Branch, with an interest in anything associated with British research. The meetings are generally of an informal nature, designed to enable the discussion of either a specific subject, current problems being encountered, or more usually, both.

New members and guests are always welcome, so if you are researching British ancestors and their families, why not come along and join us?

The topic for May was **Births & Baptisms**. Although there was a lot of 'informal' chat on other unrelated subjects, the main point of interest for the topic was the new GRO birth indexes, as detailed below.

The General Register Office for England and Wales (GRO) has revamped its online services.

The organisation now offers two searchable indexes via its website: www.gro.gov.uk/gro/ providing details of births and deaths registered in the years 1837-1915 and 1837-1957 respectively.

In the past, family historians have had to access the GRO indexes via third party services such as [FreeBMD](#), [Ancestry](#), and [Findmypast](#). This has meant noting down the volume and page numbers before visiting the GRO website to order hard copy certificates at a cost of £9.25 each. The new indexes enable researchers to click through from their findings and make purchases from the same site.

So what does this GRO online index add to the indexes already out there via *FreeBMD* and subscription sites like *FindMyPast*? For a start this is a brand new index and not a copy of an existing third party. Anyone doing family history will be familiar with the scenario – a search on two websites will not necessarily yield exactly the same results. So, this provides an extra check with which to by-pass errors and find that elusive record.

Crucially, as the GRO points out, this new index contains “*additional data fields to those which are already available and this will assist family historians to identify the correct record.*” Other indexes, because they are taken from the microfiche indexes, only include age at death from the March quarter of 1866 onwards; and for births the mother’s maiden name only features from the September quarter of 1911. This index is different. Because it is a new compilation, where possible the GRO have provided the mother’s maiden name right back to 1837; similarly an age for deaths is also included if it is on, or is legible on the original entry. The convention for recording the age as 0 for infants under 12 months is continued.

As a result, the resource could help people break down brick walls and quickly find the births of ‘missing’ children who died in between census years and for whom no other documentary evidence survives.
