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Introducing.....

Over upcoming editions, we will be introducing our committee members and other members who play a key part in the day to day running of TFHS Inc., Launceston Branch.

In this edition we are getting to know..... **Robyn Gibson.**

Robyn (*pictured right*) is our research officer and committee member and has been active in Launceston Branch for about eight years. Robyn says her interest in her own family history went up a notch about 10 years ago, when retirement gave her more time to delve into her ancestors' lives.



Like many family historians, Robyn regrets not having the opportunity to talk to older members of the family when her interest was much keener. By then, she says, she **was** the 'older generation!'

However, she recalls she was fortunate in that she grew up in a family environment in Victoria where there was certain amount of information about "who was who" and how various relations fitted in and she knew the maiden names of her grandmothers and a couple of great grandmothers. Robyn's initial goal when starting her family history was to determine when and how each of her direct ancestral lines arrived in Australia, then work backwards.

Not long after joining TFHS, Robyn was co-opted to assist with research requests received by Launceston TFHS branch from Australian and international enquirers. Currently, she is the main research officer, although from time-to-time branch library volunteers assist. Research involves sometimes lengthy research and results in a written report with attachments – fees are very reasonable. Robyn has found that one of the benefits of researching other people's families is that she has found out quite a lot about things in which she would not usually be interested. Some research requests have involved British families in India, where Robyn has no ancestral connections, but she has discovered that there are good resources available for research purposes in India, which has enabled informative research reports for clients.

As a committee member, Robyn has taken on the role of minute secretary for the committee. Thanks Robyn, for your great efforts in making TFHS Inc. such a useful resource to family historians – keep up the good work!

Using the LIST – with John Dent

In June twenty-nine members and friends gathered at Invermay for John Dent's extremely interesting and useful workshop: *Searching Tasmanian Land Records – Using the LIST*. John began by explaining the terminology of 19th century land deeds before going on to discuss sources of property data available for Tasmania, including the LIST (Land Information System of Tasmania) now available on-line.

Prior to 1826 land registration was not required by law. It was only from 1827 that property registration became compulsory, though many transactions still slipped between the cracks. Finally in 1862 the Real Property Act created the titles system we have today. Nevertheless, in the early examples presented to us by John, it was possible to see how additional data from other sources might be pieced together to help fill our research gaps. In fact, the variety of possible data available was almost overwhelming and there was much note-taking at this point in the workshop.

John is to be commended for coping without any AV support (the Launceston TFHS committee is working to remedy this issue). Fortunately, he was able to speak from printouts from his power point presentation, augmented by the handouts he had prepared for workshop participants. TFHS very much hopes to present this beginner's workshop again with the added benefit of the LIST on screen, so that John can demonstrate its use to participants. Certainly, this topic attracted much interest from members and warrants inclusion in next year's program.

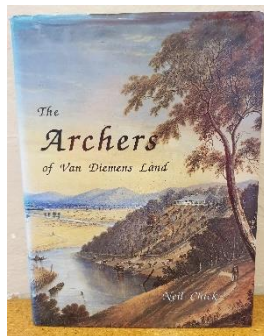

Oral History Tasmania

2021 Oral History Australia Biennial Conference October 14–16 2021 - at Tramsheds Function Centre, Launceston. The conference theme is *Oral History in Troubling Times: Opportunities and Challenges.*

The conference proper on Friday 15 and Saturday 16 October will include a keynote address by US oral historian Mark Cave, a plenary panel about 'palawa people of lutriwita Tasmania: challenges and opportunities', and some fifty presentations about diverse aspects of, and approaches to, oral history. Topics include family history, Indigenous oral histories, migration, creative writing and performance, working lives, protest and activism, community history, queer history and the AIDS epidemic.

On Thursday 14 October participants can join workshops. On Sunday Dr Aunty Patsy Cameron will lead an aboriginal cultural walk and there will be a tour to historic Beaconsfield Mine and Heritage Centre.
