# Introducing.....

#### Jai Paterson

Jai joined the Launceston Branch committee a couple of years ago. She has been assisting Fran with the newsletter and has been working with John Dent to transcribe and record some early Launceston Court Records ready for publication. Jai was born in Wellington, New Zealand and still has family in NZ whom she regularly visits when COVID permits. As a young person, Jai spent a lot of time with her grandmother who instilled in her an interest in family history, museums and bought her a book about Pharaoh Tut Ankh Amon. These things set Jai on a desire to work in museums.



After studying languages, then Ancient History at university Jai achieved her BA at Auckland University. Jai then went across the "ditch" to Sydney to do her Masters and ended up in England. She volunteered at Bristol City Museum and Art Gallery which confirmed her love of museums and led to her returning to Sydney to do a Post Graduate Diploma in Museum Studies.

Jai became the inaugural loans registrar for the new Powerhouse Museum and was then collections manager for the NSW Historic Houses Trust and then completed her Masters in Australian History.

In 1997 Jai moved to Perth (Tasmania) with her husband Nick and after working at Myer and casual work at QVMAG and freelance museum work this led Jai to writing her first book on the Commercial Traveller's Club in 2006. Research for Boags led to books on 19<sup>th</sup> century breweries and William Street. Jai was two years as a roving curator which enabled her to visit and help many organisations with their collections all around the state. Whilst still doing freelance work Jai completed her PhD which looked at historical family connections between Tasmania and New Zealand. This work re-kindled Jai's interest in her own family history. Her ancestors were a soldier/saddler in the NZ Land Wars, an English/Sydney convict who went to NZ, Scottish free immigrants to Dunedin and Fencibles from Ireland. A veritable 'united kingdom' of families.
